Rescue Committee Report

You know the old saying "when it rains, it pours?" That is what rescue has been like for the past 3 months. We have placed 5 dogs, had numerous people reaching out for help and have cried with owners who have lost their beloved dogs. Social media has been a help as well as a hindrance. People are giving up their dogs on sites like Craigs' List and Rescue Me, and I get the phone calls or emails from people across the country at all hours of the day. I have to stop sleeping with my phone!

On a more positive note, in the past 3 months we have successfully placed 5 dogs, I have met wonderful people and have a growing list of families waiting to adopt.

Our first story is a homage to Bode. Bode was a rescue dog that was placed on Cape Cod last year. He got to run

free on the beach with his weimaraner sister, Lola, and his new family--freedom that every dog should be able to have. Bode became ill with an autoimmune blood disorder. His new family lost him after only 8 months. They were devastated, I was devastated, and Lola lost her playmate. As fate would have it, the Vizsla person that put them in contact with me has given them a young pup from her litter. Run free, sweet Bode, and say hi to all of the other rescue babies for me.

Dixie's owners reached out to rescue after realizing Dixie was spending too much time by herself. They had purchased the dog for their son. As their son became older and had a job, he had less time to exercise Dixie. They put her needs first. Dixie was a little firecracker. My boys loved her and I loved her personality. I thought I found

the perfect household out on Long Island, but a voice inside of me was saying something else. The adoption that Sunday was not meant to be. The next morning I received the most wonderfully written email. Cindy and Gary had just lost their last weimaraner. They wanted to get a smaller dog with the same loving personality. They thought adopting another weim would be too painful. I immediately reached out to Cindy and Gary. They came down from Massachusetts about a week later to meet Dixie. It was love at first sight all the way around! All the families liked each other and the chemistry between Cindy, Gary and Dixie was palpable. The rest is history! The families stay in touch by Facebook. As tough as it was to give her up, the Carlsons couldn't be happier that Dixie is living a wonderful life with her new family.

I saw a picture of Payton and Hunter on Facebook. The caption from the breeder read: family emergency and the owners need to place their 7 and 8 year old dogs, hopefully together. I reached out to the breeder, having done this type of rescue twice before. She was ready to take them back after 8 years if a home could not be found. I reached out to their owner to learn about their personalities. I then reached out to my counterpart in New England, Nancy Tarbox to see if she knew any families. She had a family that only adopted senior or ill Vizslas. They had lost their last Vizsla prior to the summer and needed some time off. The summer had come to an end and Nancy reached out for me. David contacted me without hesitation. Payton and Hunter are living a wonderful life up in

Massachusetts on a lot of land. They now have the freedom to roam and people to spend time with them. This is a perfect example of how rescue is supposed to work. Their story will be in our next newsletter.

A while back I had received an adoption form from a retired gentleman who lived on an

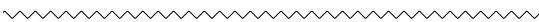

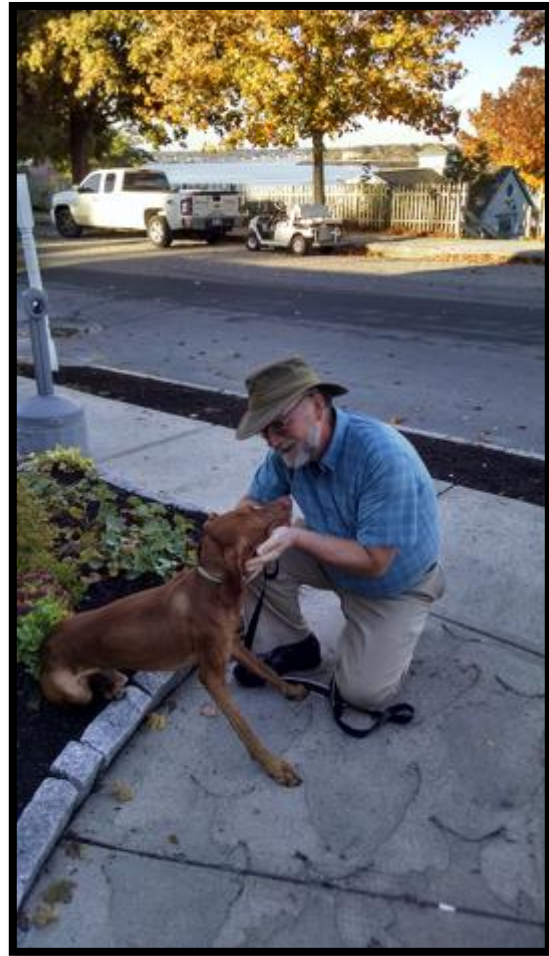


Vizsla Withdrawal Cured Nulty's Story

When I rented a home on Peaks Island Maine, they stayed behind with my wife in Concord NH. I thought surely Beo and Ella would come visit me from time to time. Nope. No way was my wife giving up their company. Until she retires, they

stay with her at our home in Concord NH.



Nulty's First Day

While dealing with Vizsla withdrawal I encountered two Vizslas being walked on the island and learned that one was a rescue. Ah, a solution to Vizsla withdrawal. I quickly made contact online with rescue of Maine, completed the paperwork, waited, and waited and waited.

Suddenly I got a call from Long Island Vizsla Rescue's Stephanie Fischer. Could I adopt a pair of Vizslas? No, this didn't feel right so I declined the adoption.

Imagine my surprise when shortly thereafter I got another call from Stephanie while vacationing in Florida. Would I consider an 8-year-old male whose owner had died suddenly? I took several days to think about it. This would put a real dent in my single carefree island lifestyle.

My mind said to look before I leaped. My heart said consider the joy that a loving Vizsla will bring into my island life. So, I stopped in Newburg, NY on the way back to Maine and picked up Nulty. He looked so sad; his coat was dull; he was underweight; he shivered and shook from anxiety. On the drive to Maine I wondered if I was up to the task.

Stephanie wondered too. She kept in close contact looking out for the dog's best interest. Clearly I was the one who had to meet her rigorous standard of care or this would be just a foster placement.

To show her my dedication and the burgeoning love affair between Nulty and me, photos have been emailed to her daily. You can see the progress we both are making in becoming a Vizsla

household. After only eleven days of care Nulty and I have become great friends. The photos helped me share my joy with family, friends and the whole Facebook world.

Overnight my ten dark months of Vizsla withdrawal ended. I knew what I was getting into, all the work that a new Vizsla requires. After one short week my spirits have lifted as Nulty and I walk along the main street of the island greeted by "What a beautiful puppy!" from everyone. Yes, what a beautiful 8-year-old puppy.

This Vizsla now has me showing him the Indian trails through the island, horses in their corral, beaches to show swimming skills, rocky shores to explore, ferry rides to take into Portland. This Vizsla has me flinging a ball into Casco Bay for him to retrieve. He shows how much he loves going for rides in the car. He makes friends wherever we go.

Who rescued who? Nulty has cured me of Vizsla withdrawal and given me a whole new set of daily activities that bring joy along with quiet night times when we both sleep soundly after busy days. My Vizsla withdrawal has been cured by Nulty who has rescued me as much as I have rescued him.

We both want to pass the Vizsla Club of Long Island's rigorous standards for adoption. Nulty and I look forward to passing from foster placement to permanent adoptive home. This rescued Vizsla and adoptive owner have become lifelong friends in eleven short days. I

To the Wonderful People that Make the Hard Choice to Place a Dog for Adoption: Dixie's Story

Within the past 18 months my husband and I lost our two Weimaraners: Sadie was our 12.5-year old that we adopted when she was four, and Buck, our 15 year-old came romping into our house when he was seven-weeks-old. They had wonderful lives and gave us so much more. The loss of a family member can be unbearably painful, but the joy of four more happy feet is immeasurable.

We've always had one or more dogs in our home. We knew we wanted to adopt this time and have had a combination of adoptions and puppies

through the years. There's no guarantee with either as far as personality or behavior. Understanding the traits of particular a breed is critical to knowing what to expect and especially their exercise needs. Having had TWO Weimaraners at the same time we were very familiar with the similarities to Vizslas, and in fact we had heard they could be even more high-strung.

I'd consider my husband and me to be very, very good dog owners. We do 90 percent of the things you should do – right. When you get a "rescue" often times you have no idea if the dog had been abused and completely misunderstood. We were fully expecting that when we filled out our application asking for a 2- to 4-year old female Vizsla, we would get a sweet dog that hadn't been trained properly, was badly behaved, probably a bit crazy, or worse didn't get enough love.

Don't Judge the Cover

The last thing we were expecting was to meet the family that raised Dixie from a puppy. We prejudged them before meeting them because we couldn't

imagine why anyone would give up a good dog. We assumed that any reasons they had were going to be made up because they just wanted to get rid of the dog (*daughter who didn't live with them at the time of getting Dixie was alarmingly allergic, and mom got a job within two years of getting Dixie, so was she alone a lot and didn't get enough exercise*). After all who is going to say they have a crazy dog and can't take it any longer? This is often the case with hunting breeds because people haven't done their research.

After going through the screening process with Vizsla Club of Long Island's Stephanie Fischer, my husband Gary and I drove from Boston to meet Dixie. We met at Stephanie's home (with her three Vizslas) and to our surprise Dixie was accompanied by the whole family to check us out. Dixie's family kept her until the right family was found and they all had to be comfortable. It is more often that adoptions or "rescues" come from foster homes.

Our meeting went so well that it was mutually decided that we would meet later that day at Dixie's home to pick her up along with her crate and boat-load of blankets, toys, special food and more love than could fit into our car. She got a care package a few days later.

We weren't rescuing a "dog," we were adopting a beloved family member. Our dogs have always been part of our family, but most people (including us) assume that adoptions are from abused situations.

By choice, we have been in touch with Dixie's original mom and dad — a lot. We sent updates the whole way from Long Island to Boston. We've sent pictures and text messages almost every day for the first three weeks and at least weekly since then. They've wanted to make sure we knew her little quirks, likes and dislikes. Her dad wanted to make sure we cuddled her a certain way that she really likes and told us about different tricks they had taught her. They wanted to know if she was eating okay. Although it is bittersweet for them to hear that Dixie has settled in really well, it is to their credit that she has.

Dixie is one of the best behaved, trained, and even tempered of the hunting breed dogs we've met. She socializes with other dogs and kids (working on our cat, Kitty!), she walks amazingly well on a leash and after three weeks we tested her in an open field. Man — she's fast, and although she'd rather stay on a scent, she's happy to return. She is funny, quirky and you can tell she was very, very loved and gives a lot in return. Indeed the "V" in Vizsla stands for Velcro.

After losing our Buck and Sadie it was hard to imagine we could fall in love again. But we have, and I am sure Buck and Sadie would approve. We just need to get Kitty on board too.

It's been five weeks since Dixie has become a member of our home. We loved her instantly and now can't imagine life without her.

I just sent Dixie's original parents another picture via text of something that is, "so Dixie."

On her second day, Dixie had settled into our lazy Sunday routine.



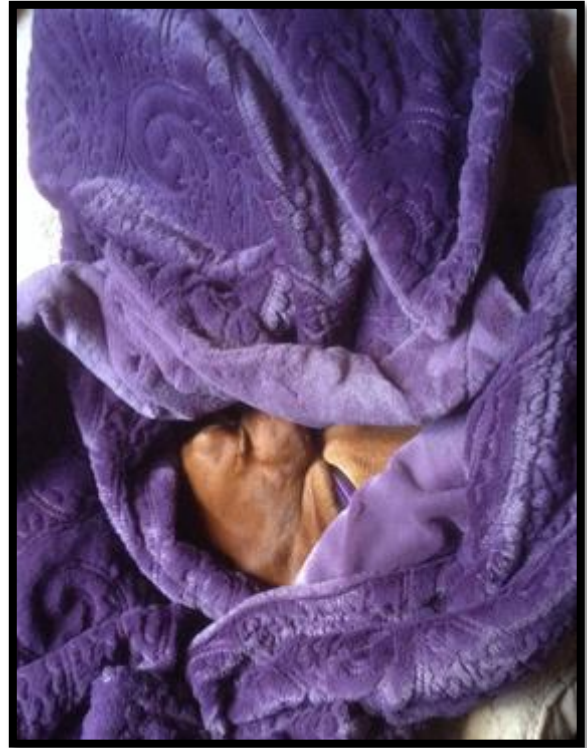
Dixie discovers there is a cat named, Kitty in her new home. They're still working out their relationship!

I work from home. Apparently Dixie's dad used to let her sit on the chair with him at the computer. I found Dixie interviewing for new candidates.



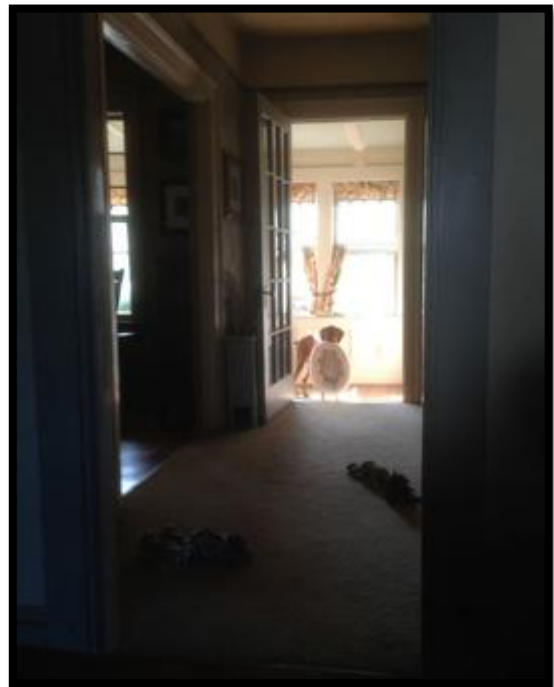
So I had to make her co-chair of my company. Now she has an equal say. Side-by-side.

Week four: We took her to meet Brady. Brady has a whole cornfield for a backyard. They had a blast. And she found the chicken coop. Good girl!



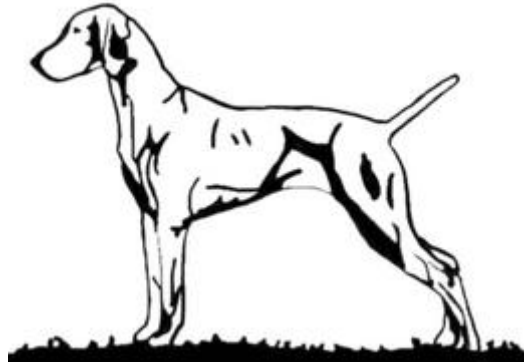

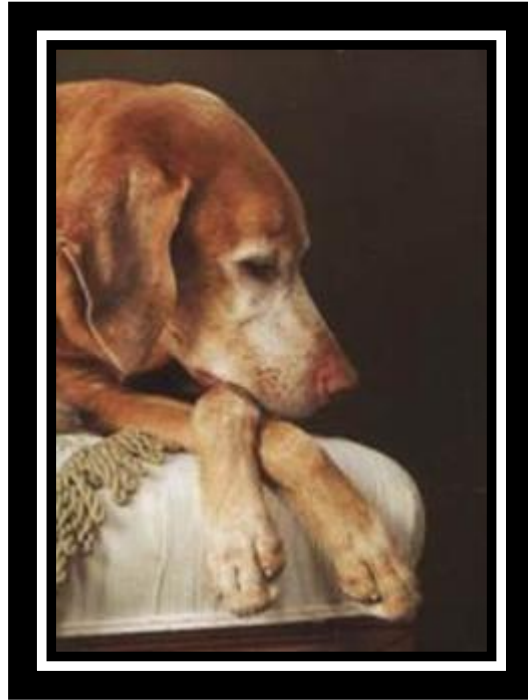
